However, after the first day you will feel so welcomed you will never want to leave! There won't be much physical labor such as building houses, but there will be a lot of emotional labor. Some of the conditions people are living in are a harsh reality. After long days of traveling and learning, unwind and reflect with the group to work through our amazing experiences together.

Trip Description:

This is a service learning, cultural immersion trip. We will be spending a few nights living with and getting to know the people from the mountain village of Arroyo de Toro. There will also be a few days spent at a Haitian workers camp, where you will be exposed to a new world of poverty and injustice. During these days we will be staying at a hotel in the city of Santiago. We also have a few fun surprises scattered throughout the trip, but we don't want to spoil them! This trip also has a one-credit class that explores the history of the injustice in the Dominican Republic.

There will be home stays: 2 students per household in the mountain village for a few nights. We will stay in a hotel in the city on the other nights. There is also a ton of great food and if we are lucky **great** dancing! This is a truly unique and amazing trip; once you go you will never want to come back!
